The Joint Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade

Like many other legislatures, the Australian Parliament has established a system of committees. Australian parliamentary committees each have a defined area of interest, such as the environment or economics. The Joint Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade (JSCFADT) has responsibility for matters relating to foreign affairs, defence and trade. The JSCFADT was first established in 1952 and has been reappointed in every Parliament since, with a gradually expanding mandate.

The Committee receives regular briefings from diplomatic representatives, departmental officials, think-tanks, policy experts, and other invited guests. The Committee has a busy schedule. Generally, the JSCFADT will meet in Canberra during parliamentary sittings and at other times or places by agreement.

The JSCFADT is organised into four sub-committees:

- · Foreign Affairs and Aid
- Defence
- Trade
- Human Rights

Each sub-committee has a Chair and Deputy Chair. The sub-committees may perform duties assigned to them by the full Committee

The Committee and its sub-committees are assisted by the Secretary and Secretariat staff.

JSCFADT membership

The JSCFADT is the largest committee of the Australian Parliament with 32 members. Membership comprises:

- Five Senators and 12 House of Representatives Members from the governing party.
- Five Senators and eight House of Representatives Members from the opposition party.
- Two Senators from a minority party or who are independents.

Senators represent their home State or Territory. House of Representatives Members each represent one of 150 electorates from around Australia.

Government Ministers do not serve on committees.

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- 17 Liberal and National Coalition
- 13 Australian Labor Party
- 2 Independent or Minority Party
- Senators

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JSCFADT inquiry powers

The committees are an extension of the Parliament, scrutinising the government of the day and considering proposed laws in detail. The Committee may convene at any time or place in Australia for meetings or public hearings.

The Committee may conduct inquiries into matters referred from a Minister of the Government. For the JSCFADT, this usually means Ministers responsible for matters related to foreign affairs, trade or defence. The House of Representatives

or Senate may also ask the Committee to undertake an inquiry. The Committee may initiate its own inquiries into annual reports of relevant Government departments and authorities or reports of the Auditor-General.

An inquiry is based on the terms of reference – essentially a statement of the topic or issues to be examined. Usually, inquiries are delegated to the relevant sub-committee to complete on behalf of the full Committee.

To complete the inquiry process, the Committee (or a sub-committee) can call for written submissions and hold public hearings with witnesses. Government officials can be called as witnesses and asked questions about policy implementation, administrative decisions or program performance within their area of responsibility.

To undertake their work freely, all committees are granted special powers and privileges that are delegated to them by the House or Houses appointing them, or are bestowed by legislation. For example, committee proceedings may not be questioned or impeached in the courts and evidence can be heard in closed session.

A report is prepared at the end of an inquiry. The Committee presents its report to Parliament with recommendations for the Government's consideration and response.

Recent JSCFADT inquiry reports

The JSCFADT has recently reported on matters including:

- Australian defence industry and exports
- Australia's overseas representation
- Care of Australian Defence Force personnel wounded or injured on operations
- Australia's trade relations with the Middle East
- The private sector's role in promoting development and economic growth in the Indo-Pacific region
- The human rights of women and girls
- Australia's advocacy for the abolition of the death penalty
